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

Exploring Long Island's Housing Crisis panel discussion

Prior to the Expo I held a panel discussion and luncheon, titled *Exploring Long Island's Housing Crisis*. Our esteemed group of panelists provided their valuable input on the state of our region's housing crisis and what steps we should take to address it. <u>Newsday covered this</u>, highlighting the tragic trend of our builders being forced to leave New York to build elsewhere due to the difficulty of developing here – highlighted by Beechwood Homes' Steven Dubb and B2K Development's Gabriel Randall. Minority Millennials Founder and President Dan Lloyd and CDLI President and CEO Gwen O'Shea touched on the hardships that younger members of our community face as they try to find a home but must look elsewhere. Babylon Supervisor Rich Schaffer and Brookhaven Supervisor Dan Panico were able to provide insight on the regulations and

red tape that can block or stall projects at the local level. At the state level, Commissioner RuthAnne Visnauskas of NYS Homes and Community Renewal was able to shed some light on the Governor's plans for addressing the issue of housing across the state and how that will look in the state budget. The panel itself was a success, with many of the 200 attendees providing great feedback. We hope to emulate this and do similar discussions in the future.

Community outreach remains a core pillar of LIBI's mission to address our region's lack of housing. With that said, the Huntington Town Board has scheduled a series of public hearings, the first of which will take place on April 30, 2024 at West Hollow Middle School, 250 Old East Neck Road, Melville, New York, at 6:00 PM, to consider the creation of the <u>Melville Town Center Overlay</u> <u>District.</u> This is an important issue not only for LIBI and its members, but for the sustainable future of Long Island as well.

Over the past year, the Town has taken a methodical approach to engage the Melville community around potential mixed-use redevelopment in the Melville Corridor. Numerous public listening sessions were held to allow the community an opportunity to voice their opinion of what the future of the area should look like. This approach should be considered the gold standard for development, because without community input, projects are destined to come under attack citing the same tried and true scare tactics that have stymied progress on Long Island for years and have resulted in the current housing crisis we face.

We expect that the usual opponents of any development will seek to thwart this proposal and already we have heard outrageous claims of 40,000 units being built, which is preposterous. The Town has, in fact, capped the total number of units at 3,000.

It is important that the home building industry turn out to support this redevelopment plan. I would ask that anyone who lives, works, or owns a business in the Town of Huntington attend the meeting on April 30th.

I hope you can join us, as our members and their stories are always the most effective advocates.

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




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
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
















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
